PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the 47th Annual Report.

Another year has passed since we met at Christchurch, and, although many things have happened in the world and in New Zealand, the year has been a peaceful and prosperous one as far as New Zealand is concerned. As far as this country is concerned, the biggest event was the change of government, and it is hoped that the new Government will be able to bring about an economic stability, which has been of grave concern due to inflationary trends.

As far as the Association's activities are concerned, four matters are to be particularly noted:

One was the recommendation brought forward at the conference held at Christchurch that members of the proposed deputation to the Minister of Immigration should arrange for a deputation to be taken and representations to be made with a view to relaxed policy of immigration affecting Indian people. To

this end, the members of the deputation had met and prepared the representations to be made, and eventually, on the 1st September last, waited upon the then Minister of Immigration, Mr. Thompson, and made the submissions. The deputation was cordially received and a frank discussion had taken place along the lines set out in the written submissions. The deputation was introduced to the Minister of Immigration by Mr. E. D. Isbey, M.P. for Grey Lynn, and the Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Carter, because he was in the constituency of one of the delegates and other farmers in the area. Mr. Isbey was asked to do so as the President and General Secretary resided in his constituency. All but Mr. Govind B. Bhula, past president and member of the deputation, were present. Mr. Bhula was unable to attend due to an engagement on the officers' conference. The Association regrets that the services of Mr. Govind Bhula on the deputation were not available.

A letter was received from the then Minister of Immigration advising that the matter has been referred to various departments and has called for reports with a view to reviewing the overall policy affecting immigration. No reply was received from the then Minister of Immigration, Mr. Thompson, subsequent to that. When there was a change of government a further letter was written to the present Minister of Immigration, Mr. Coleman, drawing his attention to the representations made by us and seeking a further appointment with a view to make further representations in the light of changed circumstances. A reply was received that the Departmental reports were not at hand and the overall policy of immigration is to be reviewed. No appointment has been given. I would like to draw attention to the incoming officers to take the matter further with a view to the deputation making some progress in the matter.

Secondly, the matter regarding the vast devastation and damage done by the hurricane Bebe to the Fijian Group of Islands, and, as usual, the Association felt that some assistance towards their rehabilitation should be given. At the committee meeting, held at Auckland, it was decided, in view of the urgency of the matter, that \$1,000.00 be forwarded to the Prime Minister of Fiji towards the rehabilitation of the people who were made homeless during the disaster. The amount was taken out of the funds of the Central Association and requests for contributions from the various branches have been made. To date the following amounts have been received from various associations: Auckland, \$300; Wellington, \$300; Christchurch, \$112; Country Section, \$100. A letter of acknowledgment was received from the Prime Minister.

Thirdly, it is gratifying to note that, as a result of the conference between the Prime Ministers of Australia and New Zealand, an agreement was reached whereby Indians residing permanently in New Zealand can now enter Australia without visas and are treated as New Zealanders.

Fourthly, the Association pledged its support to the Government and the Rehabilitation Committee for Uganda Asian migrants coming to New Zealand. They were met on arrival at Wellington by the President of the Wellington Branch, and also provided temporary accommodation. Those who came to Auckland were met by the Auckland President, Central President and the General Secretary. All families are now well settled in New Zealand and it is hoped that more families would come to New Zealand soon.

Also at the last conference the question of revising the existing constitution of the Association was raised and a sub-committee was set up to look into the existing constitution with a view to preparing a new set of rules to consolidate various amendments and any further new rules that may be required to

meet the present circumstances. The sub-committee has met and will be putting forward certain recommendations in this respect. When this recommendation comes up for deliberation by the conference, I would urge the members to give due consideration to the recommendations in the light of the present circumstances. Times have changed since the original constitution was introduced in 1926 and subsequently amended in 1958, and it requires revising to meet the present circumstances.

I would like to draw the members attention to the fact that times have changed, in that the Indian population has grown and a greater proportion of that population comprises people born here who have made their home in New Zealand, and the ties with the home country are being severed gradually. With that in view, the constitution should make provision to retain the unity amongst the members and extending activities among them with a view to integration in the community as a whole.

From time to time various members have pointed out that the present-day generation has no knowledge of Indian culture and something should be done, in that it has not been able to foster any cultural activities at a level designed among the young people, due to lack of sufficient interest and trained people among the community to undertake such tasks. The time has come when serious consideration should be given for establishing scholarships to students who would like to go to India and spend a year or so there to obtain advanced knowledge in cultural matters, such as art, music and the philosophy of life. This is a long-term view, but should be borne in mind, as something positive could be achieved in this direction.

Further activities of the Association should be expanded to meet the requirements of the present-day youth. With that in mind, the Auckland Branch has established a Youth Club, and, although it is in its early stages, it is gratifying to note that regular meetings are being held and activities are being fostered. Other branches can take this initiative and follow suit.

It is worth noting that one of our members was selected as an Olympic player with the New Zealand hockey team. We offer him our hearty congratulations on his selection and his performance at the Olympic Games in Munich last year.

I wish to thank all the members of the community for their assistance and co-operation during the year, particularly the General Secretary, who has carried out most of the work for the year. He has worked hard and kept the Association's work up to date and attended to all correspondence and matters arising therefrom.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The 47th Annual Conference of the New Zealand Indian Central Association (Incorporated) was held in Rotorua under the auspices of the Rotorua Branch Association. The conference, which was held in Geyser Hall, commenced at 10 a.m. on Easter Saturday, 21st April, 1973.

Prior to the official conference opening, the delegates were accorded a traditional Maori welcome by the Mokoia Maori Cultural Group, and entertained with Maori songs and dances.

Mr. Shivial Masters, President of the Rotorua - Bay of Plenty Indian Association, welcomed the visiting delegates, life members and others present at the meeting and wished the conference every success in its deliberations. Mr. Masters stated that we gather together annually not only to discuss our problems and achievements, but also to further the harmony and cement the bonds of good fellowship amongst the members of our community living in New Zealand.

The National President, Mr. L. N. Patel, officially welcomed the delegates, life members and other familiar faces who had attended to give their moral support

Mr. G. B. Bhula (past President) was attending the conference as an executive member of the Association and not as a delegate of the Wellington Branch. He was asked to sit with the delegates and take part in the deliberations.

Life members who were present at the conference but did not represent their branch were also requested to sit with their respective branch delegates and take part in the deliberations.

Two minutes' silence was observed by the assembly to show respect to those members and patriots who had passed away during the year in New Zealand and in India.

Before the conference resumed its deliberation's, the President suggested that the four life members present at the meeting be presented with the Life Member Badge. On approval, the President requested the life members, Messrs. J. K. Natali, Karam Singh, Ravjibhai Hira and Parhubhai Kasanji, to come forward and accept the badges. Before presenting their badge, the President introduced each life member to the conference delegates and gave a brief but comprehensive account of the details of their work for the advancement of the Association.

MINUTES FROM LAST MEETING

MINUTES

Minutes of the 1972 Conference held in Christchurch on 1st April, 1972, were read and confirmed.

Matters arising out of the minutes and action taken on last year's resolutions were as follows:—

1. Regarding School Certificate Results:

It was suggested that total marks be shown alongside the names of the first, second and third prize winners.

The prizes for 1972 were awarded as follows 1st, Dinu Patel (Auckland), 319; 2nd, Pushpa Bhana (Waikato), 307; 3rd, Shanti Morar (Christchurch), 304.

2. Regarding "P" Form:

The letter received from the External Affairs Department in India was read and discussed briefly The meeting felt that the requirement of the Reserve Bank of India was unreasonable where an Indian

national who is sponsored by a New Zealand citizen It was pointed out that the passage and other related expenses are paid in New Zealand the permit to enter New Zealand is issued by the New Zealand Government only after a thorough investigation

After a brief discussion it was resolved "That a letter be written to the Minister for External Affairs in India stating that the question of 'P' Form be waived in respect to Indian nationals sponsored by a New Zealand citizen"

3. Constitution of Wellington Indian Association

In regard to amendment to Rule 30 of the Constitution of the Wellington Branch Mr. K VasANJI (Wellington) stated that when the Central s Constitution is revised his Association will take action to amend the clause in question

4. Regarding Air Fares:

The correspondence on reduction in return air fares from New Zealand to India was read.

Mr. Brumby (manager for Air-India in New Zealand), who was to be present at the meeting to give a report on the reduction in air fares was unable to come due to disruption in air transport on account of bad weather between Auckland and Rotorua (a telegram to this effect was received) However the President who had been in close liaison with Mr. Brumby on this matter, stated that he has seen the correspondence that took place between the Auckland and Sydney offices of Air India and as far as he understands the question on air fares is still being investigated The General Secretary will be informed when the decision is reached by Air-India.

5. Regarding Life Insurance Policies:

Mr. Sakatar Singh (Pukekohe) stated that people of Asiatic origin who have been in New Zealand less than 10 years are slightly loaded on their premiums with Government Life than people of other origins. In order to pursue this matter further, it was moved and resolved: "That Mr. Sakatar Singh hand all communications that took place between him and various insurance companies to the General Secretary. The secretary will examine the correspondence and follow it up further to alleviate this loading."

6. Regarding Immigration Policy of the New Zealand Government Affecting Indians:

The President stated that the deputation met the Minister of Immigration, Mr. Thompson, and his staff on the 1st September, 1972, to present our case. The Minister heard us with keen interest and stated that before he can give any definite reply he will have to refer the matter to various departments before he can evaluate the issue.

The delegates also discussed the Ugandan situation with the Minister and assured him that the Indians in New Zealand will assist the Ugandan Asians in every way they can on their arrival in New Zealand.

With the change of government, the matter on immigration has been represented again by correspondence to the new Minister (Mr. Coleman). Mr. Colman, in one of his replies, has stated that the whole of New Zealand's immigration policy is under review at present and he will communicate further as more reports come to hand.

INWARD AND OUTWARD CORRESPONDENCE

Inward correspondence received and outward endorsed. Matters arising out of correspondence:—

1. Fiji Relief Fund:

A sum of \$1,000.00 was donated from the funds of the Central Association towards the Fiji Hurricane Relief Fund. This sum was to be recovered from the branches as follows: Auckland, \$300; Wellington, \$300; Pukekohe, \$150; Waikato, \$100; Rotorua, \$100; Taranaki, \$100; Manawatu, \$100 ;Christchurch, \$100; Country Section, \$100.

Mr. R. Vasan (Manawatu) expressed his concern at the amount to be paid by his branch. He felt that for a small branch like Manawatu to pay \$100 is out of proportion in comparison to amount of recovery from larger branches. After a lengthy discussion on the matter, it was resolved that in future amounts to be recovered be apportioned on the basis of membership.

2. South African Rugby Tour of New Zealand:

Various members expressed their views on this matter and agreed that a letter be written to the Prime Minister of New Zealand supporting him on his decision on postponing the tour.

3. Anti-Apartheid Co-ordinating Committee:

A letter from the Anti-Apartheid Co-ordinating Committee seeking financial assistance to combat apartheid policy was read and discussed. After a brief discussion on the matter, it was moved: “That the Central Association donate a sum of \$200 for the general purpose of publication of combating apartheid policy.” — Carried. R. Ganda/K. Vasan.

The amount of \$200 was to be donated from the funds of the Central Association and each branch agreed to pay voluntarily the following’ amounts: Auckland, \$75; Wellington, \$35; Pukekohe, \$15; Country Section, \$15; Taranaki, \$15; Christchurch, \$15; Rotorua, \$10; Waikato, \$10; Palmerston North, \$10.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The financial statement was duly approved and adopted. Matters arising out of the Financial Statement:—

1. Regarding Membership Fees:

Mr. K. Vasanji (Wellington) enquired as to why the amount of affiliation fees paid by Auckland varied greatly from one year to another.

Mr. T. Parbhu (Auckland) explained that, as the Indian population in Auckland is so widely spread, a great difficulty is being experienced in collecting all membership fees due by door-to-door collection. However, he stated that every effort is being made to collect as many fees as possible.

2. Moved: “That the Post Office Savings Bank account be closed and the amount be transferred into the

current account.”—Adopted. K. Vasani / Raman Vallabh.

3. Moved: “That the Secretary and President be authorised to invest the surplus funds into a Trustee Bank Account bearing higher interest.”— Adopted. T. Parbhu / R. Ganda.

4. Moved: “That in future the Financial Statement should state that the account has been audited by the auditor.”—Adopted. Dalu Patel / K. Vasani.

At this point the meeting agreed to allow Mr. G. B. Bhula (past President) to stay and take part in further business.

REMITTS AND RESOLUTIONS

From Auckland:

1. "That the number of delegates to the conference be increased from 10 to 20 members."—Majority of the members did not favour this remit and therefore it was not adopted.
2. "That Air-India be requested to open a ticketing office in Navsari to facilitate travel by members."—After a brief discussion it was resolved that a letter be sent to Air-India's office in New Zealand requesting this.
3. "That all matters pertaining to films be considered on a national basis."—Various branches expressed their views on this matter. The smaller branches showed discontent in the way the films are being distributed. The remit from Auckland was not adopted, but the following motion was moved by Country' Section and was adopted: "That the Wellington Branch be given a trial period of 12 months to obtain films from distributors in Fiji and distribute them to the branches satisfactorily."

From Wellington:

"That life members should have voting rights."—Adopted.

Moved: "That all remits handled at the conference be discussed under 'General Business'."—Carried.

GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Regarding Renewal of Indian Passports:

Mr. Thakor Parbhu (Auckland) pointed out that a circular recently circulated by the Indian High Commission's Office in Wellington stated that the holders of Indian passports are required to renew their expired passports within one calendar month of its expiry date. If this is not done within the required time then the holder will lose the right of renewal — After a brief discussion on the matter it was resolved: "That we approach the High Commission's Office in Wellington and point out that this is unusual, having regard to other passport-issuing authorities."

2. "That a letter of congratulation be written to the following:

- (a) Ramesh Patel, for being selected in the New Zealand Olympic hockey team.
- (b) Prime Minister Mr. Kirk, supporting him on his stand re postponing the Springbok tour.
- (c) Mr. B. Naik (Wellington) for being appointed a Justice of the Peace.
- (d) Kamla Bhana (Rotorua) and Kokila Amrat (Wellington), for being awarded the Duke of Edinburgh award.

3. When the Central Association receive complaints against any branch, and should any complaint be discussed at a General or Executive Meeting, an advance notice, be given to the branch concerned.

4. A member from Country Section pointed out that, whenever an approach is made by way of letter to the Indian High Commission's Office in Wellington on any matter, there has been a lack of response from its office. It was suggested that, before the Secretary can take up this matter with the High Commission's Office, the Country Section is to supply copies of correspondence to which neither acknowledgment nor reply has been received.

5. That the Constitution of the New Zealand Indian Central Association be re-written to ratify existing situations, whereby each Association (a) functions as an autonomous body, and (b) pledge's affiliation to the N.Z.I.C.A. To re-draft the Constitution, the following members were selected on the committee: L. N. Patel, T. Parbhu, J. C. Natali, S. B. Masters, R. Ganda, M. Ranchhod, K. L. Vasan and Amrat L. Vasan.

6. Mr. Kesry briefly commented on an article concerning Indians in New Zealand which appeared in one of the issues of the "Women's Weekly". In particular he enquired from Mr. K. L. Vasan (Wellington) on his statement that the early settlement of Punjabis were brought to New Zealand by the New Zealand Government. Mr. Vasan in his reply stated that he obtained the information from the past records of the Wellington Indian Association.

The President thanked all the delegates for attending the conference and making it a success. He also thanked the host Association for arranging the Maori haka and facilities during the conference.

The various delegates then briefly expressed their thanks to the Rotorua Association for its hospitality and cordial welcome extended to them during their stay in Rotorua.

The Taranaki Branch Association extended an invitation to hold the next Annual Conference in New Plymouth under its auspices. This was heartily accepted by the Association.

A very successful conference concluded on Sunday, 2nd April, 1973, at 12.10 a.m. with the singing of the Indian National Anthem, "Jan Gan Man."

MINUTES OF COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON 11 NOV 1972 IN AUCKLAND

MINUTES OF COMMITTEE MEETING Held on Saturday, 11th November, 1972, in Gandhi Hall, 156 Victoria Street, Auckland.

Present: L. N. Patel, President; Piara Singh, Vice-President; J. C. Natali, General Secretary; M. Ranchhod, Assistant General Secretary; Ajit Singh, Country Section; T. Parbhu, Auckland; K. Vasanji, Wellington; Parag Kanji, Pukekohe; Gulab Moral, Taranaki; Parbhu D. Lala, Waikato.

Apologies: Govind Lallu, Christchurch; Ambu Ramji, Rotorua.

The President welcomed the executive members and briefly outlined the purpose of the meeting. As regards to the question on immigration, he stated that the deputation delegates met the Minister of Immigration and his associates on 1st September, 1972, who heard our case with keen interest, and that each branch had been informed accordingly on this matter by the General Secretary. He also advised that so far there was no specific reply from the Minister to our deputation.

Various matters discussed and resolved were as follows: —

1. Ugandan Asians:

The President explained that the policy of the New Zealand Government is to allow 200 Asians to migrate to New Zealand, and these migrants were to be selected only from professional people and skilled workers.

Also the Re-settlement Committee was not very happy with the New Zealand Government's policy. A deputation was taken up with the Government requesting more Ugandan Asians be allowed in New Zealand and that special consideration be given for semi-skilled and unskilled people.

The following resolutions were adopted:

(1) That all branches should be prepared to provide temporary accommodation for Ugandan Asians.

(2) That the Branch Associations should inform the General Secretary if they knew of any employment that could be offered in their areas.

(3) That members who have relatives in Uganda have their applications to migrate to New Zealand referred to the Central Association so that they can be supported and referred to the Re-settlement Committee.

Mr. VasANJI raised a question of cash loans to the Ugandan Asians arriving in New Zealand. After a brief discussion it was resolved: "That a cash loan of \$100 per family be made for a period of 12 months."

2. The re-drafting of the Constitution was in no way a small problem. As each clause required thorough study, it was resolved that each committee member take the Constitution to his branch and discuss it thoroughly and send any amendments to the General Secretary for consideration.

The following members were appointed to look into the matter of revising the Constitution: Messrs. L. N. Patel, Thakor Parbhu, J. C. Natali, Magan Ranchhod, Raman Ganda.

GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Hurricane Relief Fund to Fiji:

The President outlined briefly the recent hurricane in Fiji which left many people homeless in the villages. After a short discussion on this matter, it was resolved that as there is a greater need for housing in the hurricane-struck areas a sum of \$1,000.00 be sent immediately to the Prime Minister's Fund in Fiji.

It was also resolved that, in order to reimburse the Central Association with the amount donated, the Branch Associations endeavour to contribute as follows and that the Branches be informed accordingly: Auckland, \$300; Wellington, \$300; Pukekohe, \$150; Country Section, \$100; Waikato, \$100; Taranaki, \$100; Christchurch, \$100; Manawatu, \$100; Rotorua, \$100.

2. Telephone and Address Directory:

The General Secretary pointed out that all branches must have received Directory Information Cards which were to be filled in by each member in his area. In order to re-print the new directory in the New Year, it was agreed that the branches should forward the relative information to the General Secretary by 31st January, 1973.

The meeting concluded at 3.30 p.m.
